The Incumbent's Report gave details of the many and varied duties carried out by Father Desmond during 2016 both as Parish Priest of All Saints' and Area Dean of Hillingdon.

The Parish Accounts for 2016: a booklet had been produced with statements showing the financial activities, balance sheet and cash flow details for the year ended 31 December 2016. The full accounts were available on request. The Treasurer went through the figures explaining various entries. He said that in 2016 there had been an increase in the number ofpeople giving by standing orders and the gift aid had also gone up. Father Desmond thanked Lesley Turner for dealing with the Gift Aid. Ken Marriott said fewer weekly cash envelopes left a shortage of cash to pay for flowers and the organist, Father Desmondresponded that they could be paid by cheque if the need arose.

The Incumbent's Report and the Parish Accounts for 2016 were accepted; proposed by Sheila Scoates and seconded by Joan Beavington.

Chris Clark was appointed Examiner for another year; proposed by Ken Marriot, seconded by Lesley Turner. Father Desmond thanked Chris for agreeing to stand again. Chris said that the accounts had become very complicated and were not suitable if a lay person were to become Treasurer. He recommended that a letter be sent to the Diocese asking them to review and simplify the accounts.

Jane Turnbull proposed a vote of thanks to Martin Dawe and Chris Clark for keeping the accounts in order, seconded by Father Desmond.

David Collier thanked Father Desmond for preparing a booklet giving the agenda for the APCMs, Minutes of the previous year's APCMs, the Parish Accounts and also reports from different groups outlining their involvement and activities throughout the year, which he had found both helpful and interesting.

xi. **Any other business:** there was none.

xii. The Chairman's closing remarks:

- 1. Firstly, thank you for coming along to our Annual Meetings to-day, especially on this Bank Holiday weekend. We really ought to be more present, but I am certainly not going to complain to you about those who are not here this morning.
- 2. Secondly, I want to thank all the members of our PCC for giving to All Saints' their support and their good humour in 2016. Many thanks are also due to those other people who work hard to keep our plant in good repair and looking loved, both inside and out. But just have a look at the gardens on your way out.
- 3. I thank warmly those who assist with the liturgy, who organise the music, who make the coffee Sunday by Sunday, who run or help with our sales, events and *Quiz Nights*, who keep our Halls operating and those who support All Saints' with their time and their money or both.
- 4. I also want to thank parishioners who help us to remember our history and traditions and the people formerly associated with All Saints', whether still living or departed.
- 5. All that is good here happens because of those who contribute, actively, towards the life and ministry of our parish. So a very big *Thank You* to them. However, we need, as I have said on a number of occasions before, more hands to the pump in the coming year; there is always much to be done and it cannot be left to a few people alone.
- 6. One very important financial development, negotiated at the very end of 2016, was the arrival in our Small Hall of the S Helen's College *Ducklings' Kindergarten*, which began its life and work on 1 January 2017. This has led to the *repristination* of our Small Hall, the kitchenette and the adjacent loos, things we would probably have found it enormously

difficult to fund ourselves, as well as establishing a solid income-stream for at least three years, and, we trust, longer. Now that the solicitors are exchanging paperwork, we can look forward to receiving very soon indeed some definite income from S Helen's.

- 7. We shall need this income too. Apart from the fact that, in 2018, the Diocese of London will expect us to pay £53,200 in *Direct Ministry* costs (compared to the present £52,000), in order to pay for a full-time priest and his housing, our parish accounts for 2016 point out, among other things, that we need to invest some of our income in re-pointing the outside of our Large Hall, especially on the south side, from which the rain tends to come.
- 8. We need to get our new kitchen installed in 2017, not least for our own use, but also for the use of our Hall-users. And we really must get the church clock fixed as well. To be fair, I did telephone the firm recommended to us not so long ago and asked someone to ring me. Sadly, no-one did, so I'll have to chase that up!
- 9. The tenants of our Curate's House have given notice after some eighteen months' residence. The estate agents we use are entirely confident that we shall secure new tenants the day the present ones leave and they are busy searching. We shall not, however, allow anyone to take up residence there without interviewing them first, having learned a hard lesson in the past. There is still work to be done there as well in terms of renewing the hard-standing in front of the house and having the chimney re-pointed, but we know about that.
- 10. Our Treasurer pointed out at last year's APCMs that there is a limit to the number of projects we can deal with in any one year, owing to financial constraints. In that, as in keeping us on the financial straight and narrow through the year, he is absolutely right.
- 11. We are very fortunate indeed in having assets, which can contribute to the financing of the life and witness of our work in North Hillingdon, but this must not absolve us from making a proper and planned financial contribution to that life and witness and I ask you to remember that when you review your finances. In the end, we really do find the money for the things we value and buy into.
- But, you know, the real challenge for us as a congregation is that we need to grow, both 12. numerically and spiritually. And that must involve all of us, not just the faithful hardworking few. The nature of this challenge is set out in the Parish Mission Action Plan, drawn up in 2016 and which the Bishop of Willesden described as very thorough (though when he said that to me, he did add, very hastily, that that is only what he would have expected from All Saints', North Hillingdon!). The question I now ask is whether you have all read it and whether you think it really matters. The fact is that if you fail to plan, you inevitably plan to fail. We need to engage with the *MAP* (as it is sometimes called). That does not mean that we have to be all things to all men and women, for we certainly cannot be that, nor does it mean that we have to abandon the traditions we hold, but it does mean that all of us need to seek to engage with those living in this area and encourage them to want to become part of our worshipping community. We are, in the main, a very welcoming group of people, but I sometimes get anxious when I arrive in the Hall on a Sunday morning and see the rectangles of tables with all the chairs around them occupied, in the main, by people who already know one another quite well. I wonder how a newcomer might feel at the prospect of breaking into that. Fortunately, our Electoral Roll numbers have, despite one or two losses, increased this year, but we

needto work on that in 2017. Finally, and in short, I am kept busy and am very pleased indeed to be, but I cannot do it all on my own, nor, indeed, should I.

13. And now, before we depart for home, let us stand and pray together the words which Jesus himself taught us.

The Meeting closed with a prayer at 12.50 p.m.

The number on the Electoral Roll of All Saints', following the wholesale revision in 2013, was 134 in 2014, 132 in 2015, 124 in 2016, 130 in 2017 (and is 127 in 2018). Many thanks to Bryan Child, our Electoral Roll Officer, for his work in helping me to keep the list up-to-date.

I have explained in previous annual reports and write regularly in the weekly *Bulletin* and in our Parish Magazine, *Saints Alive!* about the Sunday and week-day rhythm of prayer and worship at All Saints' and about the various ways in which I use my time, on Sundays and during the week, both as Parish Priest and as Area Dean of Hillingdon (the five-year tenure of which will expire on 31 March 2018). Further information about the life and witness of All Saints' is published regularly on the parish website.

Saints Alive!, our weekly Sunday *Bulletin* and, to some extent, our website provide a useful running chronicle of life in this parish, but all three need to be more than just an (interesting) history of our parish, for, as I have said before, as *Christians*, and so, as *Easter People*, we need to look forward and not just engage in happy reminiscence about how things used to be, if we are to take the mission of Jesus Christ to those who live within the boundaries of our parish. As is noted in the Mission Action Plan (*MAP*), drawn up in 2016 and now well overdue for revision, this is not an easy challenge for any of us, but it needs to be taken up by the congregation <u>as a</u> <u>whole</u>. It is, I think, worth asking the same questions I asked a year ago about the *MAP*. Do you know about it? Have you seen it on the parish website? Do you think it matters whether we have one or not (even though the Diocese of London requires us to)?

We can, justifiably, claim to be a welcoming church, but we need to be bigger as a congregation. The most recent research shows that being welcoming alone is not sufficient. As is often case nowadays (both in Zone 6 and elsewhere), non-church people no longer 'drop in' in any numbers to see what All Saints', North Hillingdon is like. As a congregation, we need to



extend personal invitations to bring new people over the threshold. That cannot be the responsibility of the parish priest alone; we all need to extend genuine invitations to those we know – and, as one parishioner found out at All Souls-tide in November, it really does work! Research also shows that there are crowds of people open to being invited, but it just isn't happening! Yes, we can all find reasons why <u>not</u> to do this, but I ask you to extend invitations anyway!

Last summer, we were stunned to learn of the sudden and untimely death of Brian Rockell, who had very ably organised our church music in my time at All Saints', following an accident at home. His *Requiem* Eucharist at All Saints' was very well attended – and deservedly so. His skill and organisation (and his list of visiting organists) have left a very useful legacy for us and we owe him a very great deal. *May he rest in peace and rise in glory!*

Our (honorary) Parish Pastoral Assistant for the past year or two, Mrs Julie Rochelle, moved to Devon just before Christmas 2017. I take this formal opportunity to thank her for her quiet and calm contribution to the life of the parish. Her regular visits to the sick, the housebound and the bereaved were much appreciated and will be missed. We wish her and her husband Steve every happiness in the next stage of their life in the South-West. As I wrote to her new Incumbent, our loss is very much the gain of Julie's new parish in the Diocese of Exeter!

As all parishes are now very properly required to by the 2017 edition of the *Church Representation Rules*, I need to confirm, on behalf of the Parochial Church Council of All Saints', in this report that the PCC has due regard to House of Bishops' guidance on the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults. The PCC has adopted, without alteration, the London Diocesan Policy in the matter of safeguarding and has displayed it both in church and in the Hall. Furthermore, the PCC has appointed a Safeguarding Officer and has, for a number of years, included Safeguarding as a standing item at meetings of both the Parochial Church Council and the Standing Committee of the PCC.

A summary of the examined Parish Accounts and the Balance Sheet for 2017 are included as a single insert in this report. *A copy of the full accounts for 2017 is naturally available on request and is displayed on the notice board at the back of the church.* We are very grateful to Martin Dawe, our Parish Treasurer, for preparing them, for explaining them to the PCC and for keeping us very much on the financial straight and narrow throughout the year. We are also grateful to our Independent Examiner, Chris Clark, for his work in 2017.

As I said at the Parish Eucharist a Sunday or two back, we recently received our copy of the *Common Fund Certificate* for 2017. This is a new venture on the part of the Willesden Area; from it, you will see that, in 2017, we had to find just over <u>£1,000 each week</u> to pay to the Diocese of London to meet the costs of a *full-time resident* priest. This is even before we open the church doors. That figure has increased in 2018. (*But please do not imagine for a moment that it represents what I am paid each week by the Diocese of London in stipend (wages)!)* Fortunately, we are able to use parish property, provided for us by previous generations of parishioners, to generate income through valuable lettings, but it remains a fact that income from property is enabling us to meet both our (parish and Common Fund) financial commitments each year. Though we are not alone in this situation among parishes in the

Hillingdon Deanery, we need to be much more *intentional* in striving to meet at least half those commitments through congregational giving and stewardship.

We worked hard on the maintenance of our buildings in 2107 and this needs to continue as funds allow, not least to save needless additional expense later on, but we do well always to remember that, without the people, the buildings are no more than expensive monuments.

The various contributions included in this booklet are a very good (if deliberately *concise*) reflection of all that went on here in 2017. I thank very genuinely all those who take a share in organising and carrying out our worship and our social life as a parish, as well as those who work hard to maintain our buildings and grounds, thus making them well cared for and admired by those who pass by. I also thank those who otherwise support All Saints' with their time and their money or both. More volunteers to assist with the day-to-day work are always needed, however; please consider carefully what more you may be able to offer - in terms of your talents, your time, your commitment and your money - to God's mission in North Hillingdon in 2018.

DEANERY SYNOD REPORT 2017

There were three meetings during the year. There took place at S Edmund of Canterbury in Yeading, S Mary the Virgin in Hayes and S Johns, Hillingdon Hill.

In February, the Reverend Steve Morris (Vicar of S Cuthbert's Church in North Wembley) talked about a project called *Memory Café*, started in 2015. Membership of the café reflects the local community with Christian, Hindu, Sikh and Muslim members, of whom many are elderly and some with Alzheimer's. People come together to chat, share a cup of tea, do memory exercises, chair aerobics and generally find a connection with neighbours.

The June meeting was the AGM with elections for the various officers and committees. A representative from the London Diocesan Board for Schools was also elected. A lengthy discussion followed relating to the proposed building of a new CofE secondary school in the north of the Borough. Synod generally felt that the south of the borough might benefit more.

In October the meeting was entitled *Grave Talk* .As our speakers, we had a father and son from

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HOME START HILLINGDON

Home-Start Hillingdon operates from the office space above the Hall. It is a registered charity. We support parents who are experiencing difficulties and have at least one child under five years of age. We select volunteers with parenting experience from the local community and train them to provide emotional and/or practical support to families by home-visiting support, potentially helping to prevent crisis and breakdown.

Volunteers work effectively with families with complex and often interrelated needs. We specialise in supporting families who do not meet the threshold for a statutory service, but who are, nevertheless, struggling with significant challenges and difficulties, such as post-natal illness; children with additional needs, multiple births, or several very young children. In this way, we aim to avoid needs escalating to the point where statutory intervention is required.

SOCIAL COMMITTEE 2017


Summer Fête: A good day with lovely weather and great company; we raised a good sum of over $\pounds_{1,200}$ toward the new Hall kitchen.

I use *Facebook* and *Twitter* to promote our Services and social/ fundraising events, drum up prizes and support from local businesses for our Summer *Fête* and much more.


