A VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

Dear Saints!



Spring is in the air ... it's a time when all creation bursts into life, when those with 'SAD' (Seasonally Affective Disorder) shake off their winter blues. In February we had Rev Richard Young visit to 'mission enable' us. He brought with him lots of statistics about All Saints parish that showed compared to London:

- We have slightly more families with children and less single people.
- We have more Christians (and more Hindus).
- We are ethnically more White (and more Asian).
- We are relatively wealthy and have more home-owners.

And how can we grow the church? Suggestions by members of the congregation last Sunday included:

- More prayer!
- Why should people come to us? We should get out!
- Community Outreach ideas: Establish better Links with local groups and organisations with young people, including Oak Farm School & other local schools, Uxbridge College and Brunel University.
- Community in-reach ideas: Become a social hub for e.g youth, single mums and their children, more music events.
- Church building ideas: Have the church open more, more special events in the church, so not so scary
- Church service ideas: Encourage more families and younger ones to come to church; be less formal and more modern songs.
- Biblical ideas: copy what Jesus and the early church did!

There is lots of good things here. They all have value. The important thing is that we are beginning as a congregation to have a grow mindset. I remember a church growth researcher called John Wimber observing that growing churches all had a sense of excitement, that the congregation had an expectation that they were going to meet God in their worship. Ultimately what we offer the world is a relationship with a loving God and a loving community. Let's give up something in Lent and use that hunger to seek what the Lord has for us, as individuals and as a church.

Two Patron Saints' Days

March sees the Saint's days of Wales and Ireland. Did you know that Saint David and Saint Patrick may be linked?

According to historic-uk.com, Patrick – Patron Saint of Ireland – was born in Wales, near where St David's city is now, and foresaw David's birth.

St David



A biography written in 1090 by Rhygyfarch, son of the Bishop of St David's, claims that David was descended from royalty; his father was Sandde (or Sante), Prince of Powys, and his mother was Non, the daughter of a chieftain of Menevia. The site of his birth, on a clifftop during a storm, is marked by a holy

well and the ruins of a chapel. In medieval times, it was believed that David was a nephew of King Arthur.

Young David was supposedly educated by St Paulinus, and grew up to be a priest. Legend says that David performed several miracles, including restoring Paulinus' sight. He is also credited with making the Leek a Welsh emblem, when he advised Welsh fighters to wear a leek in their helmet, to recognise each other as friends in a battle against the Saxons. Shakespeare, however, suggests that the leek was adopted when Welsh fighters defeated the French in a leek field.

As a missionary, David travelled through Wales and Britain, and as far as Jerusalem, where he was made a bishop. He founded 12 monasteries, and made Menevia (now St David's) his bishop's seat. He was made Archbishop of Wales in 550 and died on 1st of March in 589AD.

In 1120, David was canonised, and later declared Patron Saint of Wales. St David's Day is celebrated by Welsh people around the world by wearing a leek or daffodil. They may also wear a national costume, eat traditional Welsh cakes and bread, or hold an Eisteddfod.

St Patrick



Patrick was probably born in Wales, or a Welsh-speaking part of western England, about 386AD - probably into a wealthy family - and may have been named Maewyn Succat. It is thought that he was taken by Irish pirates, and worked as a slave - perhaps a shepherd - for 6 years in Ireland.

He escaped to Gaul and studied to become a priest. He eventually returned to Ireland to join early missionaries converting the Irish to Christianity. Patrick is credited with creating the Celtic Cross by adding a Sun symbol to the Christian Cross as he merged local customs with Christian practces.

As he travelled throughout Ireland, Patrick established monasteries, churches and schools, and is said to have used the shamrock to teach about the Holy Trinity.

He died on 17th March 461AD, and this day has been adopted for Patrick's Day celebrations. Celebrations are particularly popular in America, where even the Chicago River is dyed green!

Traditional Easter Biscuits



These biscuits are easy, delicious, and have a lovely consistency.

Warning: they do tend to go very fast indeed.

140g (5-60zs) salted butter 280g (11-120zs) self raising flour 140g (5-60zs) caster sugar Finely grated zest of 1 lemon 55g (20zs approx) raisins 1 medium egg

Method

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to 190c or gas mark 5
- 2. Rub the cold butter into the flour well.
- 3. Add the sugar, lemon zest and raisins and bring together gently.
- 4. Add the beaten egg and mix well.
- 5. Roll out to $\frac{1}{2}$ cm thick.
- 6. Cut out with 8cm (3 inch) diameter plain cutter.
- 7. Bake for 15 minutes, until lightly browned and cooked.
- 8. Remove from the oven, cool, then remove from the tray
- 9. Store in an airtight container and don't eat them all at once.

I hope you enjoy making and eating these biscuits.

Shalom

Jewish people all around the world for thousands of years have greeted each other with the word "Shalom" (שׁלום).

According to the Oxford Dictionary, "Common Hebrew greeting. 'Shālōm' indicates security, contentment, good health, prosperity, friendship, and tranquillity of heart and mind." The Hebrew word for peace, shalom (שלום) is derived from a root suggesting wholeness or completeness, and throughout Jewish literature, it is bound up with the notion of shelemut, perfection. Hence, if you notice to the traditional Aaronic Blessing, mentioned in Numbers 6:23-27, it ends with Shalom in Hebrew, typically translated as "peace", but what God wants to bless us with, according to His grace, is much more than this. According to Isaiah 9:6, Jesus Christ has the title 'Sar Shalom' (שלים), which means 'Prince of peace'. The Hebrew name for Jerusalem is Yerushalayim, which means "city of peace." In Psalm 122:6, we read: 'Pray for the peace of Jerusalem: may they prosper who love you. Peace be within your walls, Prosperity within your palaces'. As the hostages come home, let us unite in prayer for Shalom for everyone affected and for enduring peace in Jerusalem. We place our trust in the Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ, who promised to leave his Peace with us.



The book opens with a dead body on the floor of a run down all-female boarding house, but which of the lodgers is the murderer?


